

The total ARP Allocation of the City of New Orleans is about

\$388 Million



About 59% of the City's usual annual operating revenue

Funds are to be used for expenses from 2021 to 2024, and must be expended by 2026.






New Infrastructure Spending, 2022-2026 (in billions)




